### **Stone Wall Installation Project**

We are excited to use the money earned to purchase fruit trees for long term plans for orchards on the property. The kids have helped choose the varieties of trees and are researching the harvest yields, hardiness, disease resistance and maintenance plans for the orchard. The progress was slowed by the cold weather but now we are ready to add the composted soil from Chris Coleman to the middle and plant a beautiful specimen tree and native plants.

The project started with a volunteer day attended by Sierra and her Chickadee, Skye, Andrew with Paxton and Jovie, Steph W., Jack Westfall, Roy Wood, Jared Martin, Jayne W. and Kaylee with Mike and Hummingbird, Nola. 

Maria Montessori believed that sensorial experiences begin right after birth. Babies and children use their senses to explore, discover, and learn about their environment. The discoveries made using the hand are extremely meaningful to the child and his/her development. Through her scientific observations of children, Dr. Montessori determined that children not only craved hands-on learning activities, but they exhibited joy when doing these types of activities. By touching and manipulating objects, information is delivered to the brain through the hands. Because this method allows children to be an active participant in their learning, the concepts covered are more deeply established in the mind than any kind of rote memorization could be.

In Science, we have had a chance to visit and explore some curriculum revolving around the animals on the school grounds like the bunnies, tadpoles, chickens and the ducks at the vernal pool. Prior to our visit with the animals, we did some work in science planting flowers and beans. The flowers sprouted quickly but the beans have grown much more than the flowers. We think we might make a bean maze. A bean maze is when we put a bean plant in a maze and put a cover on it with a hole in it to see if the plant can find the light. We planted Marigolds and a Prairie Mix of Flowers. Each class had the opportunity to plant two bean plants and now we have a lot of beans.

### **Nightingale Montessori Celebrates Earth Day 2025**

The first **Earth Day** was held in the United States in 1970 when concern about the environment and interest in ecology was increasing. Today, Nightingale Montessori has a cross curricular focus on understanding ecological connections between species, systems, to our collective past and our common future. Throughout the week students showed Earth love by; planting trees at our school - thanks **Eagle** team, picking up trash at Buck Creek, planting gardens, removing invasive plants, visiting the gently used Book Fair and visiting Clark County Solid Waste Districts Recycling Center. ### Wing Integrated Montessori curriculum—Test Phase

The Wings are developing and testing a new curriculum in World History and English this year that aims at fostering more independence, student-led topic choices, and work that integrates more fully with other classes. During the fourth quarter, the English class is working on the Victorian era, while World History has been covering the 19th and 20th centuries. A variety of books on the topics are available to students to help them craft assignments that interest them. This is a bit of an adjustment for some students, but is part of our long-term goal as an adolescent Montessori classroom to guide students through "valorization." Valorization is a process named by Maria Montessori to describe how a young person grows into adulthood with confidence, strength, resilience and capability. We plan to develop this new classroom curriculum further in the coming year so that it includes more subjects and allows more freedom in classroom scheduling and work time.

This quarter's English topic is the Victorian era. For my creative assignment I dressed up as a Victorian noble woman for a day. 


